## RESUME

**Thesis of Karimova Natalya Ermanovna on the scientific degree competition of the doctor of sciences in 07.00.03 – General history / 07.00.09. – Historiography, a source study and methods of historical research specialities subject: “The Relations between the people of Central Asia and China in the XIV<sup>th</sup> –XVII<sup>th</sup> centuries” (based on the Chinese sources).**

**Key words:** The Relations between Central Asia and China; XIV<sup>th</sup> – XVII<sup>th</sup> centuries; Ming Dynasty; Amir Temur; Temurids; Chinese sources and literature; source study; international relations; political-economic relations; Chinese missions; Fu An’s mission; Chen Cheng’s mission; trade-and-ambassadorial relations; Eastern Turkistan; Kumul; Turfang; trade routes; Lobnor; Issyk-Qul; Suyab; Talas; Great Silk Road.

**Subjects of the inquiry:** The Relations between Central Asia and China in XIV<sup>th</sup> –XVII<sup>th</sup> centuries, based on the Chinese sources.

**Aim of the inquiry:** To carry out a comprehensive analysis of the relations between Central Asia and China in XIV<sup>th</sup> – XVII<sup>th</sup> centuries; to study, to systematize; to analyze and to put into scientific use the information of Chinese sources

and literature on different aspects of the relations between China and Central Asia at the time of Temur and his descendants.

**Method of inquiry:** comparative, impartial, historical, systematical, logical. Comprehensive critical analysis of written sources is used taking into account the concrete historical and political situation in the explored region.

**The results achieved and their novelty:** Detailed study of the internal and external political aspects of relations between China and Central Asia in XIV<sup>th</sup> – XVII<sup>th</sup> was carried out; information of Chinese sources on History of relations between Ming China and Temurid's Empire were studied and systematized; the information from writings of Chen Cheng and other Chinese sources on historical geography of Central Asia was put into scientific use; little known information from the Chinese sources regarding the trade – and – ambassadorial contacts between Central Asia and China in the abovementioned period was studied and accompanied with scientific comments; Chinese materials concerning trade routes in Central Asia in the abovementioned period were revealed and examined.

New approaches towards research of the relations between the people of Central Asia and China were determined; authentic and erroneous information on some aspects of such relations were revealed. Comparative analysis of Chinese sources and English materials was done.

**Practical value:** The materials of dissertation would greatly extend source study resources of Sinology in Uzbekistan. The results of this work can be utilized as materials for further research on the history of relations between China and Central Asia, as well as for study the policy of China towards Central Asia.

**Degree of embed and economic effectivity:** The main ideas of the dissertation were reflected in the 1 monograph and 23 scientific articles.

**Sphere of usage:** The materials of dissertation can be used for compiling the manuals, for writing the new history of Uzbekistan and for lecturing in the history and source study at the appropriate Institutions. The statements and conclusions of the dissertation might be useful for political scientists in the process of creation the new concepts in a sphere of relations between Central Asia and China.
